Policy Statement:

An Applicant to the Designated Health Profession of Dietetics (an "Applicant") who has a permanent disability, a temporary disability, a medical condition or disorder, a religious reason, or any other reason that warrants accommodation may request accommodation for the Assessment for Substantial Equivalence (the Knowledge Assessment and/or the Practical Assessment).

Except in unplanned/unforeseen circumstances, a written accommodation request must be received at least four weeks prior to the date of an assessment.

A request for accommodations requires completion of at least one of the following forms, as applicable:

• Form A: Application for Testing Accommodations (completed by the Applicant)

(completed by the Applicant)

 Form B: Application for Testing Accommodations for Mental or Physical Disability— Related Needs
 (completed by the appropriate regulated health-care professional, as described

within the form, and supplemented with supporting documentation as indicated)

Form C: Application for Religious Accommodation

Reasonable accommodations may include (but are not limited to) additional time to complete the assessment, additional breaks during the assessment process, and/or the use of a reader. The College will provide reasonable accommodation at no additional cost to the Applicant; however, the Applicant is responsible for any costs associated with requesting the accommodation, including any costs to complete Form B or collect supporting documentation.



The decision to approve or deny an accommodation request will be made by the Registrar or their delegate. The College reserves the right to refuse any accommodation request that threatens the psychometric soundness, reliability, fairness, and/or security of the exam. Decisions will be communicated within 10 business days of the College receiving all completed documentation.

1. Policy Rationale and Purpose:

Accommodations for professional assessments are modifications that reduce or remove barriers that would otherwise prevent an Applicant from demonstrating their competence. When considering a request for accommodation, the College must balance the rights of the Applicant with its mandate to protect the public interest. A reasonable accommodation is an adjustment to the standard testing conditions that ameliorates the impact of an Applicant's disability/condition without:

- Altering the nature of the assessment or the College's ability to determine whether the applicant possesses the essential knowledge, skills and abilities required to practice dietetics in Canada.
- Imposing an undue burden on the College or other applicants.
- Compromising the security, validity or reliability of the assessment.

This policy outlines the requirements for requesting an accommodation for the Assessment for Substantial Equivalence.

This policy applies to Applicants to the Designated Health Profession of Dietetics who are required to take the Assessment for Substantial Equivalence.

The Assessments aim to confirm that Applicants meet the entry-level competencies to practise dietetics safely in British Columbia.

The College reserves the right to seek another expert opinion.



SECTION B (COMPLETED BY THE APPROPRIATE HEALTH-CARE PROFESSIONAL)

The purpose of the Assessment for Substantial Equivalence is to assess Applicant competence aligned with the Integrated Competencies for Dietetic Education and Practice (ICDEP) at the same level expected of a student who has successfully completed an approved Canadian dietetics education program. As such, the Assessment for Substantial Equivalence is an important process to support the College's regulatory functions and mandate of protecting the public.

The Assessment for Substantial Equivalence is composed of a Knowledge Assessment and a Practical Assessment. The Knowledge Assessment is a 3-hour computer-based multiple-choice exam without a break, administered in a virtual format. The Practical Assessment is a 2.5-hour virtual panel interview with case-based scenarios. The Assessments aim to confirm that Applicants meet the entry-level competencies to practise dietetics safely in British Columbia.

We rely on the health-care professional's expertise to recommend a specific accommodation based on their understanding of the Applicant's functional limitations and needs associated with the disability.
