Registrant: Daljodh Khaira, Physical Therapist

Practice Locations: Surrey and Langley, BC

Nature of Action:

On August 29, 2024, a complaint was received concerning Mr. Daljodh Khaira, Physical Therapist (the “Complaint”). A panel of the Inquiry Committee of the College of Health and Care Professionals (the “Panel”) investigated the Complaint pursuant to section 33(1) of the *Health Professions Act* (the “Act”).

Action Taken:

On December 12, 2025, Mr. Khaira voluntarily entered into a consent agreement (the “Agreement”), pursuant to sections 33(6)(c) and 36 of the Act, in which he:

1. Consented to a public reprimand for failing to maintain professional boundaries, engaging in behaviour that constitutes sexual misconduct and failing to maintain clinical records contrary to the *Updated Standards of Practice for Physical Therapists of British Columbia* and the *Code of Ethical Conduct*.
2. Consented to a 30-day suspension of his practice of physical therapy from December 23, 2025, to January 22, 2026.
3. Consented to quarterly audits of his clinical records for a period of eighteen months beginning on January 23, 2026, to ensure compliance with the College’s Documentation Practice Standard.

The Panel determined this to be a serious matter under s. 39.3 of the Act requiring publication.

Reasons for the Action:

On December 11, 2025, the Panel approved the Agreement to address its concerns that Mr. Khaira had failed to maintain professional boundaries with a client, had initiated and pursued a non-therapeutic relationship with a client, had engaged in a sexual relationship with a client, and had failed to maintain adequate clinical records. In reaching its decision, the Panel took into account that Mr. Khaira’s failures not only impacted the individual client, but also had the potential to impact on patient care, patient safety and the public interest more generally if not addressed. The Panel considered that the remediation steps outlined in the

Agreement were necessary to ensure that Mr. Khaira understands and adheres to the Standards of Practice and Code of Ethical Conduct and provides safe and ethical future care as a registered Physical Therapist.

The Panel is satisfied that the Agreement contains sufficient terms to ensure that Mr. Khaira learns from this experience, that the profession is cautioned from engaging in similar conduct, and the public is adequately protected.
