



# PUBLIC NOTICE

## **Nature of Action:**

On April 7, 2024, the Registrar of the College of Psychologists of BC (the "CPBC") received a complaint concerning the Licensee (the "Complaint"). On June 28, 2024, the CPBC amalgamated with six other health colleges to form the College of Health and Care Professionals of BC (the "College"). A panel of the College's Inquiry Committee (the "Panel") investigated the Complaint pursuant to section 33(1) of the Health Professions Act (the "Act").

## **Action:**

On March 30, 2026, the Licensee voluntarily entered into an undertaking and consent agreement (the "Agreement") pursuant to section 33(6)(c) and 36(1) of the Act, in which he:

1. consented to a suspension from his practice of psychology until such time as he provides the College with further information, as specified and required by the Panel; and
2. undertook and consented to practise under the direct supervision of a registered psychologist, to be approved by the College and at his own cost, for a period of nine months following his return to work.

The Panel determined this to be a serious matter under s. 39.3 of the Act requiring publication.

## **Reasons:**

On its review of the evidence obtained during the investigation of the Complaint, the Panel identified concerns relating to the quality of a client assessment conducted by the Licensee, the extended time the Licensee took to deliver an assessment report to a client without reasonable explanation, and a failure by the Licensee to attend an appointment with a client without reasonable explanation. On review of the information provided, including submissions received from the Licensee, the Panel concluded that regulatory intervention was warranted in response to the concerns identified.

The Panel is satisfied that the terms of the Agreement are suitable to address the concerns with the Licensee's practice and to protect the public.



**Update as of March 30, 2026:**

The Licensee provided the College with the information required to comply with the terms of his suspension on March 30, 2026. The Licensee's practice of psychology is no longer suspended but remains subject to the condition of direct supervision as set out in the Agreement.
