Frequently asked questions

Where can I find information about the interpretation of a restricted activity and whether it requires certification?

Restricted activities are listed in the **Regulated Health Practitioners Regulation**. The regulation that is specific to the professions of CHCPBC, the **Health and Care Professionals Regulation**, includes which restricted activities are granted to each profession.

When a restricted activity is limited, a profession-specific purpose is listed in the regulation to better clarify the context and scope of the activity that can be performed. The regulation also indicates whether the activity requires certification.

For example, for physical therapy, here is an excerpt from the Health and Care Professionals Regulation:

Other limited restricted activities

- 50 (1) A physical therapist may administer oxygen by inhalation.
- (2) A physical therapist may insert an instrument beyond the point in the nasal passages where they normally narrow, beyond the pharynx or into an artificial opening into the body for the purpose of airway suctioning.

Restricted activities if certified

- 51 (1) A certified physical therapist may perform a procedure on tissue below the dermis by inserting solid filament needles for the purpose of reducing inflammation or managing pain.
- (2) A certified physical therapist may reduce a dislocation of a joint.
- (3) A certified physical therapist may insert an instrument, device, hand or finger beyond the labia majora or anal verge for the purpose of assessing or treating the pelvic floor.

This means a physical therapist **may only** insert an instrument, device, hand or finger beyond the labia majora or anal verge if 1) they are certified, and 2) it is for the purpose of assessing or treating the pelvic floor.

Why is there an additional fee to be certified?

The regulation and oversight of certifications require additional resources to regular annual licensing. Certification applications involve review to ensure licensees meet the requirements of a certification program, additional processing and communication with licensees, and updating of the public registry. Not all healthcare professionals are authorized to perform certified practices, and it is therefore not part of the calculation to establish licensing fees.

Additionally, there are incremental costs in other regulatory programs associated with certifications. For example, Certified restricted activities are considered higher risk practices that may require the development of support resources (e.g., specific criteria for quality assurance) and can lead to more complex and costly complaint investigations.

CHPCBC fees were set based on the cost of administering existing certifications at that time. We will re-evaluate the costs of administering certifications and recommend changes if and when appropriate.

A listing of certification fees is included in **CHCPBC's fee schedule**.
